This study guide is designed to help you discover the key principles of the Christian faith and help you to grow and become a faithful follower of Christ. Christ is an amazing model to us showing us how to love and obey God, when He walked upon the earth. Everything the Bible instructs to do as followers of Christ, He modeled throughout His life. Our gift of salvation is a free gift from God, it does not require any prerequisites, but it does require action, commitment, and a new way of thinking and living. God gives us the Holy Spirit as our tutor and guide and empowers us to carry out all of the instructions He gives us. Each person who comes to faith in Christ must learn to live in their new life, however, many times new converts receive no guidance or instructions on how they attain the principles of their new life.

This guide is designed to help you in understanding and learning the way of walking in faith and conducting yourself as a child of God. 2 Corinthians 5:17 says, "Therefore if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creature; the old things passed away; behold, new things have come." The "new creature" is our hearts, mind and spirit being changed by Christ's living in us. We received this power at the time we decided to follow Christ. This is a lifetime decision, not a fair weathered decision, and not a decision based on selfish motives. Christ explains this to His followers in Luke 14:25-35. I encourage you to read 1st and 2nd Corinthians along with this guide for an even deeper discipleship experience. God has called us into His kingdom out of His love and kindness. We are taught in Romans 12:1, that it is our "reasonable act of worship" to honor and obey the teachings God has given us through Christ and those He has given charged to speak on His behalf. 2 Timothy 3:16-17 says, "All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; so that the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work."

Our "good works" can only be done in the power Christ has given us through the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is the evidence of a true conversion as He empowers us to conduct ourselves in godliness. I hope that you will be encouraged as you begin this guide. You can



Working it Out

So then, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed, not as in my presence only, but now much more in my absence, work out your salvation with fear and trembling; for it is God who is at work in you, both to will and to work for *His* good pleasure. (Philippians 2:12-13)

As a follower of Christ, you should know God's Word, His nature, His expectations, His plan for your life, and how to continue in the spiritual journey that leads to eternal life, this is the "working out of your own salvation". Christ tells us that there is a cost to following Him. We must pick up our cross daily, meaning we must continue to walk in the commitment we made to give our lives to Him daily. No one comes to God without Him allowing our spiritual eyes to be opened and our hearts to yield to His commands. The process of our spiritual walk includes the following:

Spiritual Process



Just as God used the Prophets to speak to His people in the Old Testament, He used His Apostles and Disciples to speak to the Body of Christ, "The Church" in the New Testament. The New Testament includes the Gospels which are accounts of Christ's coming and His ministry, Paul's Missionary journeys, where He and other followers of Christ, planted the first churches and spread the Gospel throughout the world. The New Testament also includes Paul's letters to the churches he planted during his missionary journeys. They include letters to believers from Romans to the Revelation of Christ, which tells what will happen in the final days before Christ returns. When we are born-again, Christ transforms our lives from the bondage of sin, into a new life of power over sin through Holy Spirit. He is the power of God that works in us, as we yield to His conviction in our spirit, we become changed in what we think, how we act, and how we treat others. We receive the same power from God that raised Christ from the dead, that builds us up into a new spiritual person. However, this is a lifelong process. We never stop yielding to Holy Spirit. We always need Him, to keep sanctifying and purifying our heart and our character. This study guide has been created to help new believers learn the process of maturing in Christ and embracing the power of the Spirit-filled life.

A summary of the Old and New Testaments is provided on the next page. This discipleship study focuses on the books of the New Testament because these are the books that teach born-again believers how they should live. The Old Testament books are very important as they teach us how God was faithful in bringing forth His promises within the Old Testament which was the pathway to the coming of Christ and His reconciling mankind to God. I hope that once you complete this discipleship study, you will be equipped to stand firm in your faith, understand God's Word and His expectations of you, and allow the process of sanctification to take center stage in transforming you from the old sin-oppressed person to the new person in Christ, where sin is no longer master.

A Summary of the Old and New Testaments

Here are some details about God's word to help you understand how the Bible is laid out and how it is consistent and flows together throughout all 66 books of the Bible.

1. The first five books of the Bible are the Books of the law:

Genesis – Exodus – Leviticus – Numbers – Deuteronomy - These books are also called the Pentateuch, which means "5 books" and in the Hebrew Bible these first five books are also called the Torah.

2. The historical books:

Joshua- Judges –Ruth -provide a detailed account of the children of Israel's settlement into the promised land, their turning away from God's word, God's provision for His children by bringing forth judges over Israel, and finally in the Book of Ruth bringing forth the linage of David through which Jesus Christ would bring forth salvation to mankind.

3. The accounts of the Kings of Israel:

1st and 2nd Samuel, 1st and 2nd Kings, and 1st and 2nd Chronicles provide details of the rulers over Israel as they demanded that their people be ruled by a King. God gave Samuel the task of finding a King for His people and warned them of the strife and oppression to come. 1st and 2nd Chronicles were a detailed account of all the Books of the Bible from Genesis to the Kings in Israel. These Books provided the children of Israel who came back from captivity in Babylon with the history of their people.

4. Events during the Captivity of Israel - Ezra - Nehemiah - Esther - Lamentations - Ezekiel - Daniel - Haggai - Zechariah

These books all give accounts of Israel during the times of captivity. The children of Israel lived in captivity for 70 years. Lamentation, Daniel, and Ezekiel provide an account of the first part of their captivity under King Nebuchadnezzar. Ezra, Nehemiah, and Esther are accounts of the children of Israel after their captivity when they returned to Jerusalem by the first proclamation made by King Cyrus to Ezra to build the temple, and the final exodus by King Darius to Nehemiah to build the wall.

5. The books of Wisdom

Psalm, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes and Song of Solomon are all books of wisdom written by David, his son Solomon and others during those times.

6. The Books of the Prophets

The Books of the Prophets are not laid out in chronological order as they took place in history. Each book of the Prophets lists the time of the King under which they prophesied. Reading the opening chapter will allow you to place each Prophet in his correct place in Biblical time and will provide a consistent and cohesive chronological message.

A Summary of the New Testament

1. The Four Gospels – Matthew – Mark – Luke – John

The four Gospels were written to give us a record of Christ's family line in Matthew chapter one and Luke chapter three. Although the Gospels reference four different Apostles, their canonical authors were anonymous. Early church fathers accredited each of these Gospels to their authors because of the detailed accounts that would be known by them. The message of the four Gospels was intended for the Jews as Jesus coming was for the reconciliation of the Jews first. Christ speaks vividly throughout these books to provide the purpose of His coming, His death, and His resurrection. Christ's message to leaders is plain and clear as He warns against the coming deception, the persecution of those who follow Him, and the entry of false teachers and false doctrine within the church. Jesus instructs us and commands us to love God and others. The two greatest commandments are given to us. (NASB Matthew Summary)

2. The Book of Acts

The Book of Acts opens with the Ascension of Jesus into heaven. This picture in the first chapter of Acts is instrumental in providing fundamental truth for believers. We are given a firsthand account of Christ's entry into heaven which seals our hope for His return from heaven to gather us on the Last Day. The Book of Acts also provides details about the beginning of the Holy Spirit's work in the life of the believer. We learn about life at the beginning of Christian fellowships. The institution of church offices and the purpose of the church family. We meet Saul, who is met by Christ on the road to Damascus to persecute those who were following the Way of Christ. Paul was then designated as the missionary to the Gentiles and set up churches in many areas in Asia Minor, Greece, and the surrounding area.

3. The Book of Romans

The Book of Romans begins with a staunch warning to those who would turn away from God and embrace immorality. Romans is a very in-depth look into the soul of man and the motive of man's heart. It also details the entryway to salvation for the Gentiles through the sinfulness of the Jews who had rejected Christ and disobey God's commandments. Romans challenges the believers to not be slaves to their flesh but to live according to the power given to us through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. There is a constant theme of walking by faith, trusting in the work Christ did for us on the cross and not being ruled by our flesh.

4. The Books of the Epistles – 1&2 Corinthians – Galatians – Ephesians – Philippians – Colossians – 1&2 Thessalonians

These Epistles give the believer very detailed and candid instructions on developing a new mindset as followers of Christ. We are instructed on how we should treat each other in the Body of Christ, and how we should treat non-believers. We are also encouraged to look to our blessed hope in Christ when He returns to gather His bride into eternity. These Scriptures are a mirror for the believer. They give us a clear measuring gauge as to whether we are growing in spiritual maturity and attaining the fullness that Christ afforded us through His death. We are also warned of the error of false teachings and false teachers that will creep into the church body.

5. The books of Timothy- Titus - Philemon

These Epistles speak of Church order and leadership and the character of church leaders. They speak specifically to church overseers who are in charge of shepherding God's people. These books give us a great foundation for church mentoring and leadership development. We are instructed as to how we should choose church leaders and warned against not being diligent in choosing godly leaders who are mature and faithful to the teachings of Christ.

6. The book of Hebrews

The author of Hebrews is unknown. The focus of Hebrews is the purpose and significance of the New Covenant provided through the sacrifice of Jesus. Hebrews opens with a proclamation of Christ's reign as He is seated at the right hand of the Father. We get a picture of the significance of Christ coming in putting aside the Old Covenant and fulfilling the requirements of the Law through His sacrifice. This is also explained in depth in the chapters of Hebrews. Hebrews builds the foundation on which we rest our faith—Jesus Christ. We have rest in His completed work on the cross and the New Covenant greatly surpasses the Law and the works of purification necessary to atone for sins. Christ finished that atonement for us on the Cross.

7. The books of James – 1&2 Peter, 1, 2, &3 John and Jude

These books continue where Paul left off in exhorting the believer to embrace sanctification and holy living. We are repeatedly compelled to evaluate who we are live as believers. We are challenged to live our lives worthy of the calling for which Christ called us to live. Through the Holy Spirit, we can accomplish this godly lifestyle as it is God's Spirit that empowers us to live holy. John's Epistles compels us as believers that the central basis of the Christian life is love. Loving God, loving righteousness, loving each other, and loving God's Word. We are constantly reminded that a life that is not reflective of a loving heart is not a life lived for God. Jude focuses on our love for truth. When we abide by the Scriptures and allow them to mold and shape us, we are giving evidence of our love for God's truth.

8. The Revelation of Christ

The final chapter of Scripture is Revelation. This book is a culmination of all the Prophetic messages of Scripture that warn us of the Second Coming of Christ. It is Christ's message to those of the Israelite nation and to us who believe in His death and resurrection. Revelation is a thriller that brings us to our new home in the New Heaven and New Earth. It is suspenseful and exciting, so much so that many movies and films depict its thrilling message. Revelation provides a glimpse into the supernatural world. We are provided with a picture of heaven and the events that will take place as this world comes to an end. We see the final defeat of the devil and his false prophets. We see the result of man in his arrogance when God brings about His final wrath.

We find our peace and our rest in understanding how the story ends and the rewards of eternal salvation, that only a perfect sacrifice can provide. Our faith is sealed, and sin is defeated once and for all. What a glorious picture to behold. I hope you will be exceedingly blessed as you explore the New Testament. If you have read and studied the Old Testament, you will gain a complete picture of the message God has provided for us through His Prophets, Apostles, disciples and Christ our Savior. From Adam to Revelation God designed a pathway of reconciling us to Him. The fall of man was not the end of man, and God made certain that the one who brought destruction to man's spirit would face his destruction in the end.

OBJECTIVES OF THIS LESSON:

- To understand how to live a bold life of faith in Christ
- To be empowered to live free from the sins of our past
- To embrace the victory that we have as born-again believers in Christ

Memory Verse: Romans 8:1-2, "Therefore there is now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death."

Read/Application: Read Romans chapter 8 and answer the questions below, then apply what you have learned daily.

1. Romans chapter 8 describes a beautiful picture of our new life in Christ, in the opening verses 1-4, how does Paul explain how the requirement of the Law was fulfilled?

2. In verses 5-8, Paul provides a description of how the flesh works to enslave us, what understanding do you glean from this?

3. In verses 9-11, Paul gives an explanation of what sets the believer apart from the unbeliever, what is this unique identifier that sets us apart?

- 1. Verses 12 -17 gives us some very specific details about those who are authentic children of God, how are we now empowered to live differently?
- 2. Romans 8:25 describes the hope with which we look forward to our eternal glory, what is the anticipation of this hope and why is this important for us to grasp?
